INAUGURAL PARADE RECAP

On January 18th, 2025, The West Virginia Semiquincentennial Commission had the honor of participating in Governor Patrick Morrisey's Inaugural Parade. Despite the cold weather, many spectators lined Kanawha Boulevard to watch the parade in the new Governor's honor.

Aside from the Semiquincentennial Commission, participants in the parade included The West Virginia Air National Guard Honor Guard, the Beni Kedem Shriners, Charleston Job Corps, Attorney General J. B. McCuskey, Secretary of State Kris Warner, Auditor Mark Hunt, The Charleston Police Honor Guard, the West Virginia University and Marshall University Marching Bands and mascots, and several high school bands from across the state.

IT'S HISTORY BOWL SEASON!

In 2010, the West Virginia Division of Culture and History, now the West Virginia Department of Arts, Culture and History, began an exciting new challenge for eighth graders to test their West Virginia history knowledge: the West Virginia History Bowl Tournament. Teams of students from around the state face off in an academic bowl competition focusing on West Virginia history, literature, arts, architecture, geography and culture.

Regional tournaments are held in eight regions across the state (based off former RESA regions). The regional tournament winners and the runner-up team move forward to the state tournament held in late April at the Culture Center, State Capitol Complex, in Charleston. A Play-In tournament is held after the conclusion of the regional competitions to allow teams from all across the state to compete for a second chance to qualify for the State Championship.


Eighth graders in public, private and home school education programs are eligible to compete on the four-person teams in double-elimination tournament play.

In 2026, the United States will mark our Semiquincentennial: the 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. THE NATIONAL COMMISSION VISITS

On April 23, 2025, the National America 250 Commission will hold its meeting right here in West Virginia!

The U.S. Semiquincentennial Commission established Congress in 2016 to plan orchestrate the 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. Appointed by the House and Senate leadership of both parties, the nonpartisan Commission is composed of 16 private citizens, 4 U.S. Representatives and 4 Senators, as well as 12 ex-officio members from all three branches the federal government and its independent agencies.

The National Commission will visit the State Capitol in Charleston on April 22, and will host their meeting at the Culture Center on April 23.




REVOLUTIONARY READINGS

Be sure to visit the Archives Library at the Culture Center to take a look through Stanard's *The Story of Virginia's First Century*.














THE INSPIRED SERIES

OLD TIME COUNTRY COOKIN'

New England Raspberry Cake


 $\underline{Ingredients}$ - 1/2 cup butter, 1 cup sugar, 2 egg yolks, 2/3 cup milk, 2 cups flour, and 1 teaspoon baking powder

<u>Preparation</u> - This old-fashioned, delicious cake is baked in layers. Mix the butter and sugar to a cream, add the egg yolks well beaten and the milk; then stir in flour, in which has been sifted the baking powder. Bake in jelly-cake pans. For the filling, crush slightly 1 quart raspberries, add 2 egg whites, 1 cupful powdered sugar, and a few drops of lemon juice. Whip until thick; spread between layers and over the top. To be eaten with cream.
